## What is the purpose of the General Plan?

The General Plan is a long-term guide that helps the community make decisions about physical, economic, and social development conditions over the next 10-20 years. The plan includes a vision statement, maps, goals, objectives, and general policies. The plan addresses issues such as land use, growth, transportation, housing, open space, and the environment.

## Why update the General Plan now?

State law in Arizona requires all cities and towns to have a "comprehensive, long-range general plan for the development of the municipality." These plans must be updated and approved by voters every 10 years. The City of Maricopa's current *Planning Maricopa* General Plan was last ratified by voters in 2016.

## What topics does the General Plan address?

State Law requires certain topics, or elements, be addressed based on the population of the community. The following list identifies elements that are required for the City of Maricopa:

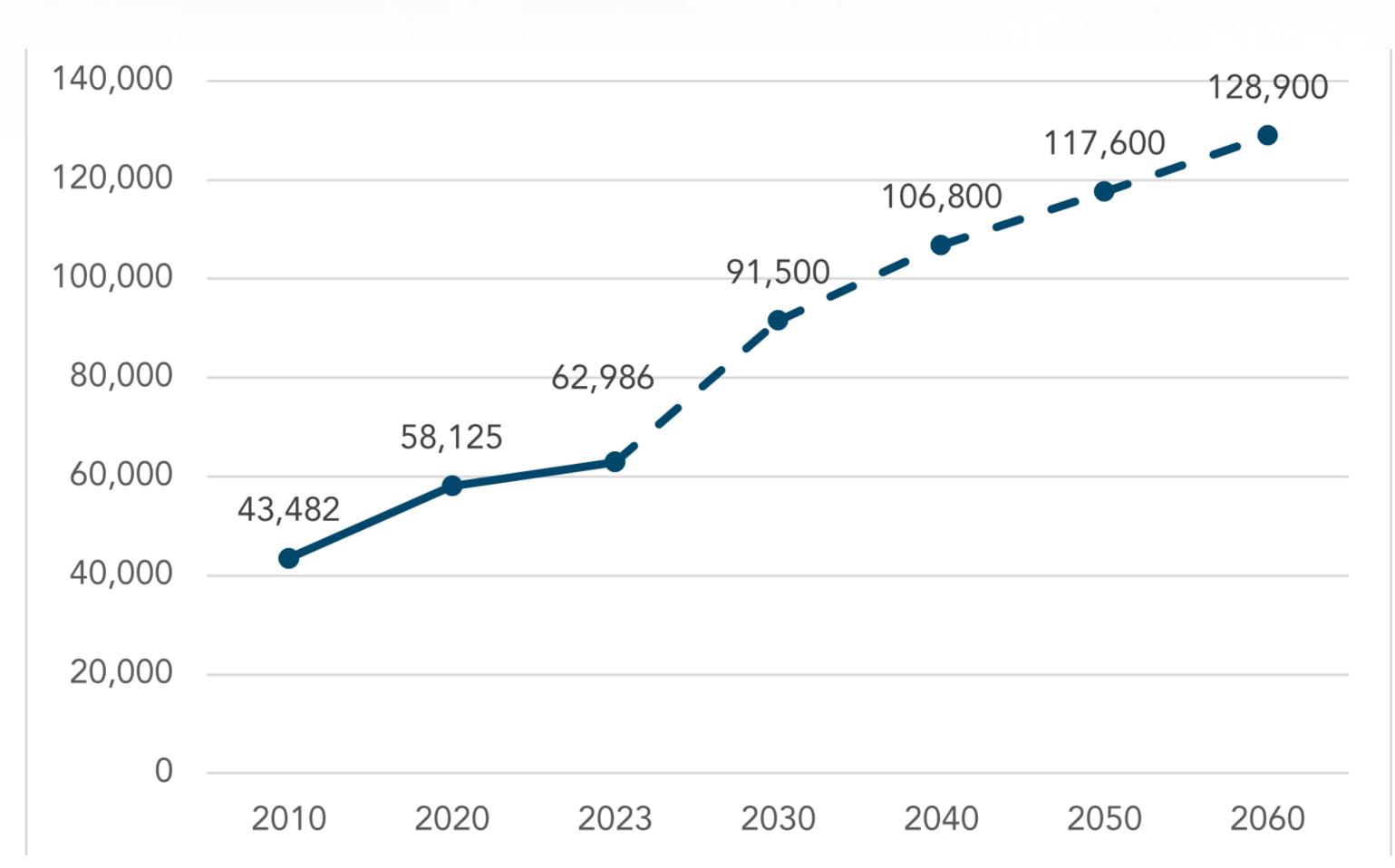

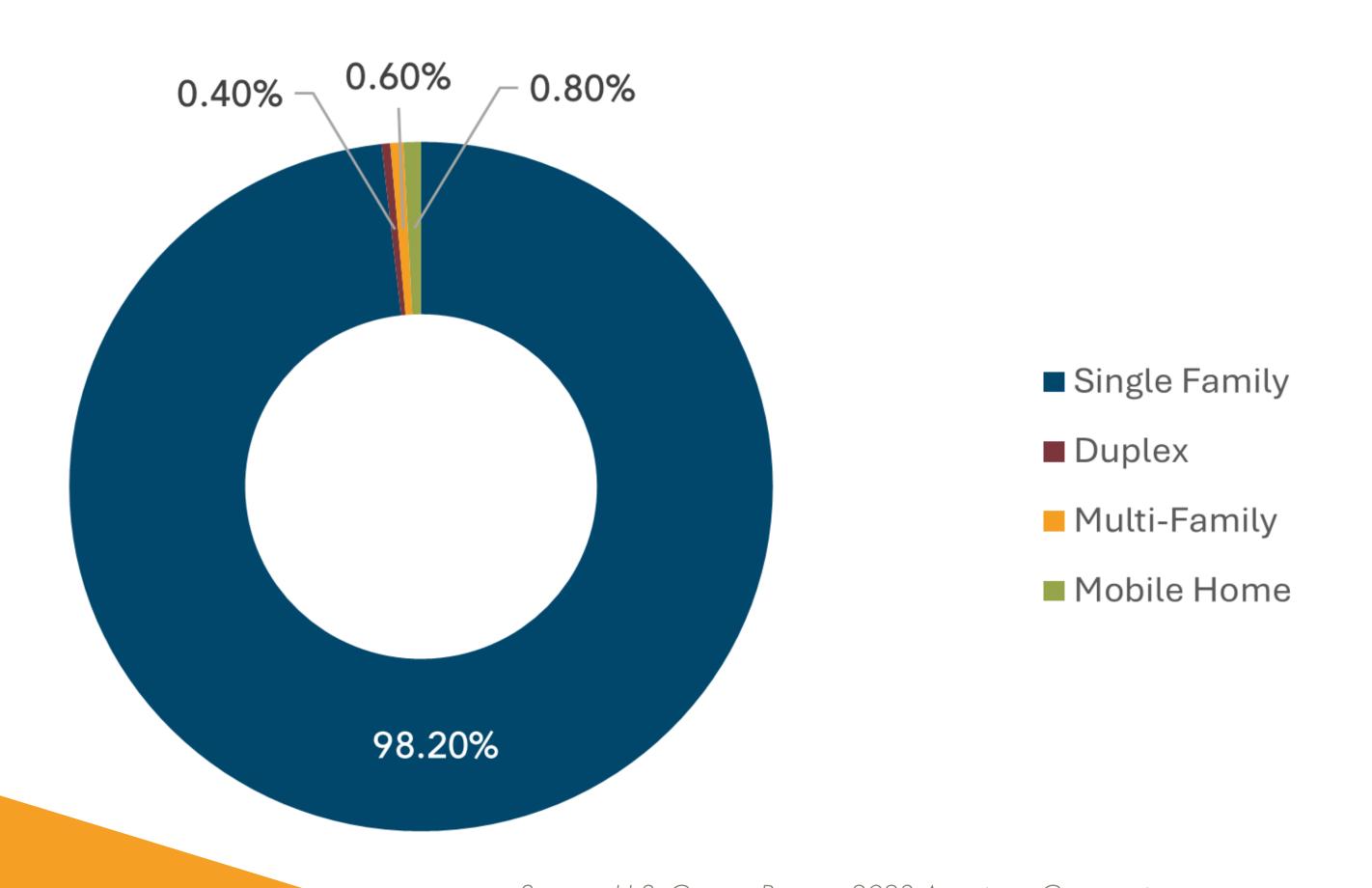

#### POPULATION PROJECTIONS



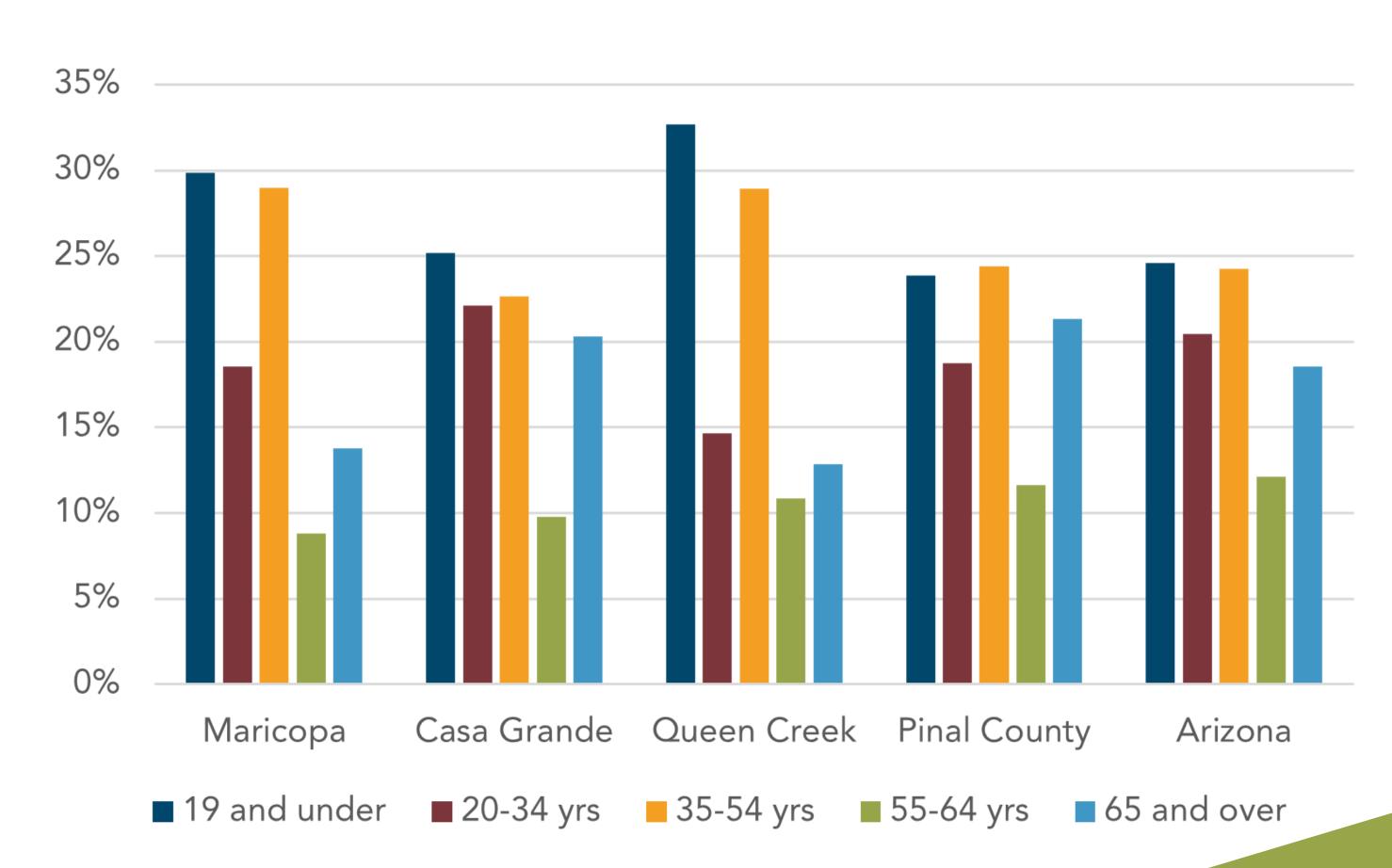

#### HOUSING TYPES

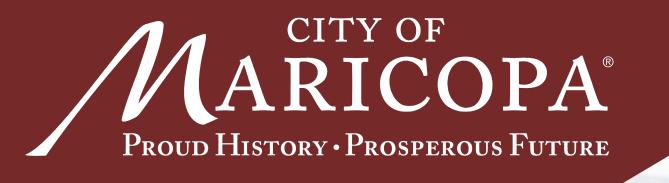

#### **AGE COHORTS**



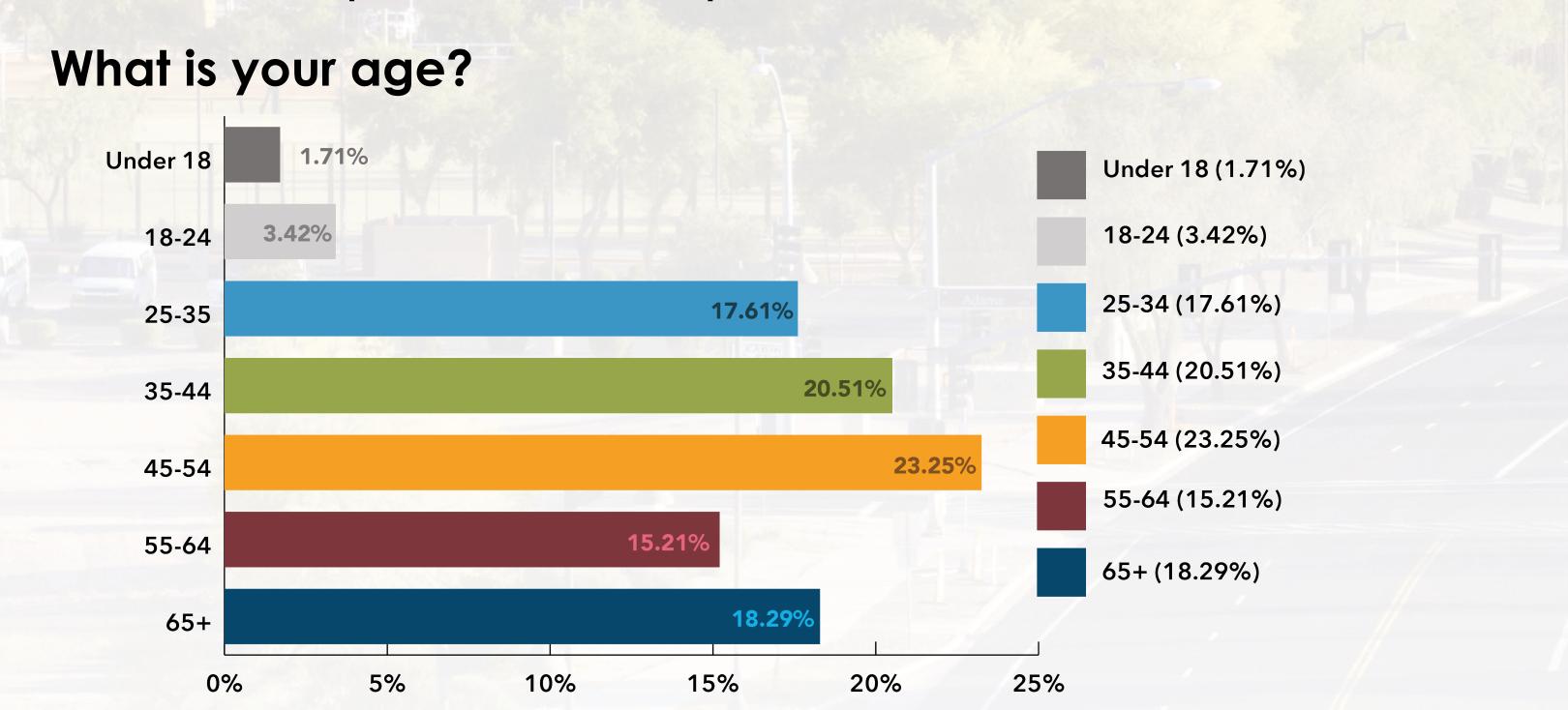

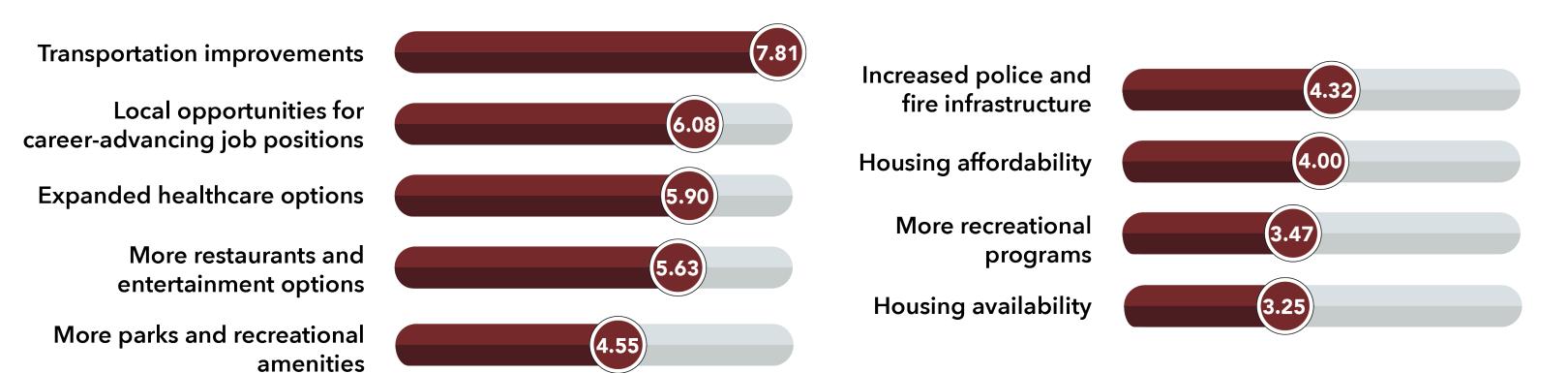

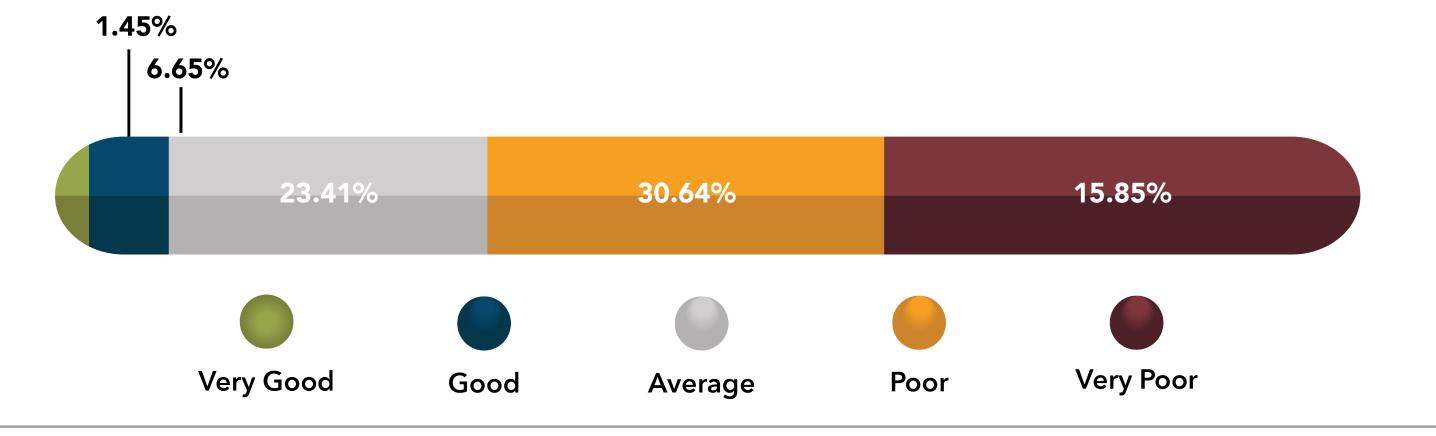




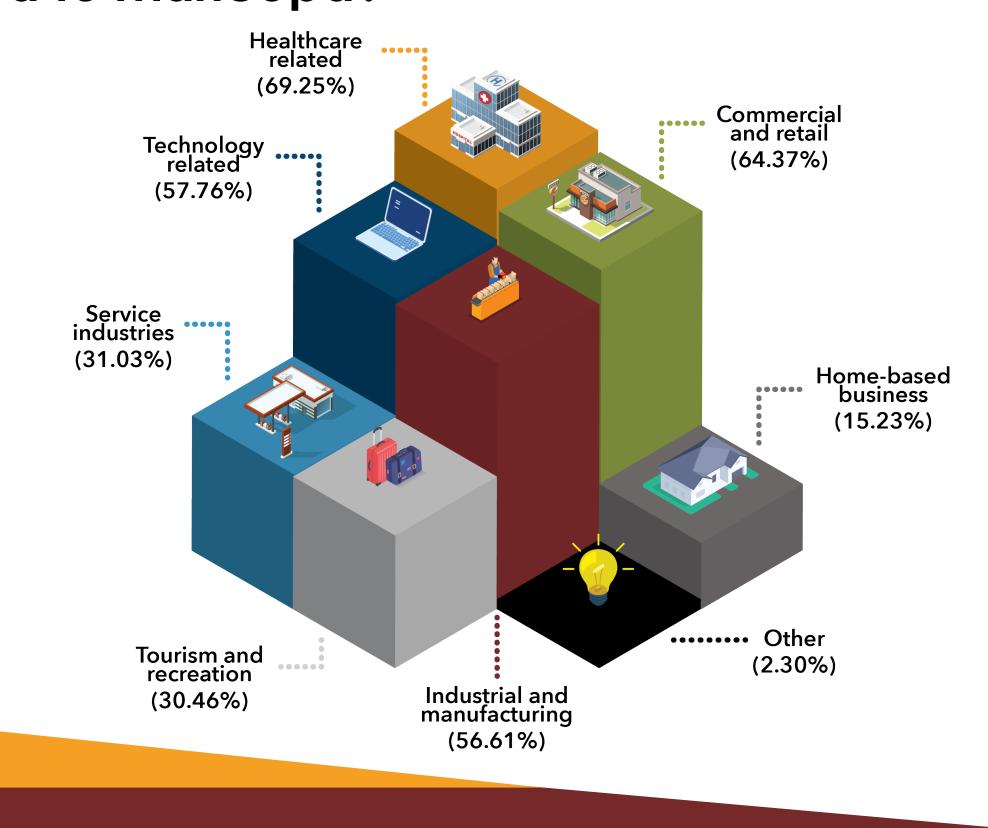
#### How would you rank the following topics for Maricopa in order of priority?



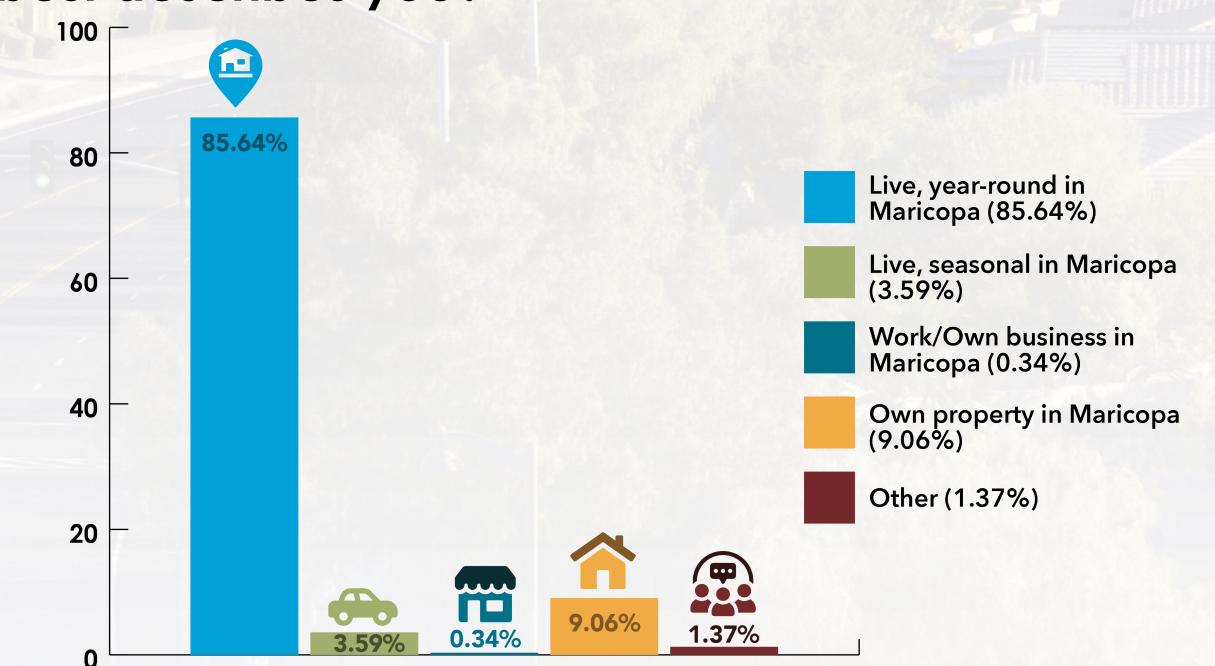
How would you rate the current state of the active transportation infrastructure within Maricopa (i.e., bicycle routes and walking paths?)

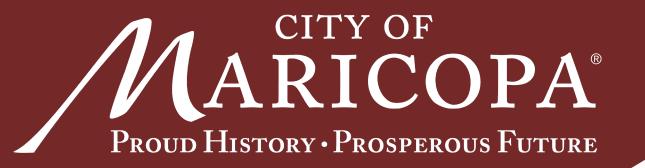


#### How would you prioritize the following transportation improvement concepts?

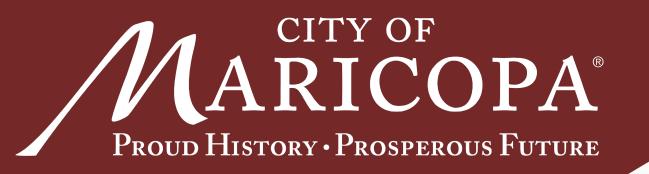

## Land Use/Housing

### Statements

- Maintain the unique identity of Maricopa's neighborhoods while accommodating new development that complements existing land use patterns.
- Housing developments should support a diverse range of buyers (young families, first-time buyers, seniors, etc.) to support opportunities for affordable home ownership while also accommodating market rate communities—both are essential for a balanced housing stock.
- Designate sufficient land for cores anchored with commercial and employment centers served by restaurants, retail shopping, and cultural enrichments that ensure compatibility with surrounding development.
- Encourage development of village centers anchored with commercial and employment hubs served by restaurants, retail shopping, and cultural enrichments.
- Protect agricultural land and open space from premature conversion to more intensive uses through land use planning.
- Promote the heritage of Maricopa through the preservation of historical areas and structures.

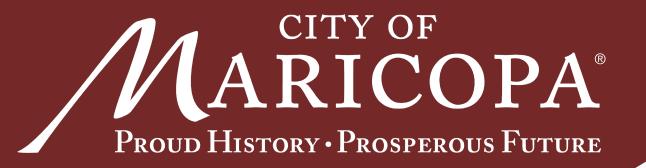

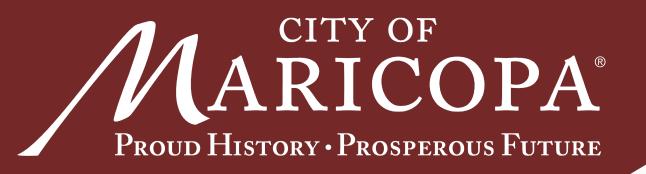

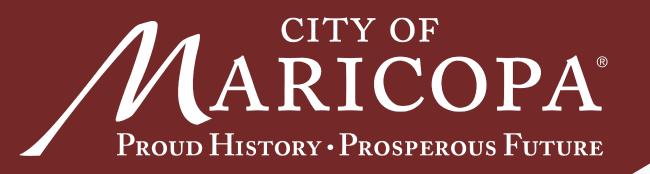

# Parks/Open Space/Environment

## Statements

- Ensure that the quantity, quality, and variety of parks and open spaces expand in proportion to overall growth, including recreation areas and natural preserves.
- Develop a well-connected network of parks, trails, and open spaces that are accessible to all residents, including safe pedestrian and bicycle routes linking neighborhoods to recreational amenities and local destinations.
- Advance Maricopa as a regional and national hub for youth sports and recreation.
- Support a diverse range of recreational programs and community events that serve residents of all ages and abilities.
- Strengthen the City's ability to respond to natural hazards (i.e. flooding, excessive heat, wildfires etc.).
- Ensure that the regional utility providers for the City offer alternative, sustainable energies such as solar and wind energy for residential, commercial, and industrial use.
- Promote local and regional efforts to improve air quality.

Agriculture		Commercial	
The Agriculture category recognizes farming and other agriculture as one of the principle land uses in the planning area. Agricultural uses have impacts to immediately adjacent properties making lower intensity land uses such as large lot, single-story residential appropriate transitions adjacent to agriculture. The density range of this category, in accordance with statutory requirements, is up to 1 residence per acre; however, the continuation of lower densities as required by existing zoning is supported.		The Commercial land use category provides for commercial nodes on individual parcels. The intent is to provide neighborhood and community scale shopping, offices, medical facilities, and subordinate multi-family residential uses which incorporate pedestrian and neighborhood needs through site planning, architecture, access, lighting and parking design. Single-family residential uses are not supported. For larger parcels, over 40 acres, regional retail development is anticipated in this designation.	
Rural		Light Industrial	
The Rural category promotes the continuation of the rural character that a common across much of the planning area. Rural areas may include arming and small scale livestock operations along with low density esidential and other uses defined in the Zoning Code for the respective Zoning District. Public infrastructure and services are not required at a evel as great as in higher density development. Several rural enclaves exist in the planning area and should be preserved. The density range of this category is less than 1.0 dwelling unit per acre.		The Light Industrial category designation is intended to provide areas for the development and perpetuation of light industrial activity involving light manufacturing, assembling, warehousing, and wholesale activities and the associated office space and support uses. Areas designated for Light Industrial have adequate transportation and infrastructure access with an emphasis on minimal conflict with existing adjacent land uses.	
Low Density Residential		Research and Development	
he Low Density Residential designation accommodates semi-rural arge lot development with generous distances to streets and between esidential dwelling units and a viable semi-rural character setting. Limited westock privileges may be a part of this character for areas where lot zes are a minimum of one acre. Areas in this category are generally arger lots with accessory structures that may be used for animals. The maximum density for this land use category is 2.0 dwelling units per acredu/ac).		The Research and Development category is intended to accommodate a variety of employment and educational uses. Technology centers or campuses that include training, education, testing and secondary manufacturing are encouraged. Research and product development laboratories and related facilities are supported in creating a working and learning center for the community.	
Medium Density		Employment	
Residential The Medium Density Residential category provides for a suburban lifestyle with planned, single-family residential neighborhoods, which include ignificant open space, recreation and cultural opportunities, including chools, churches and neighborhood facilities. Medium density residential levelopments are expected to contribute to off-site infrastructure needs for which they create a demand including roadways, bridges and prade separated crossings. Medium density residential areas comprise the majority of residential land in the City. The density of this land use ategory is between 2.0 to 6.0 du/ac.		The Employment land use category is a broad designation intended to accommodate numerous types of development including office, industrial and commercial, allowing for varying scale and intensity of land uses. While industrial, warehousing, manufacturing, processing and non-retail commercial activity are expected, retail and wholesale activity are in no way prohibited from locating in the Employment designation. Preferred uses include lighter industrial use such as light manufacturing and business park development, also professional offices, including medical facilities, clinics and associated office support services. Residential uses are not intended in this designation.  Employment sites are to be integrated, through design, buffering, and	
High Density Residential  he High Density Residential designation provides for multi-family wellings that may be multi-story buildings. This category would provide		siting, with adjacent residential or other activities. Typical developments have their own driveways, parking areas, identification signs and landscaping. Developments with more than one building share a common architectural theme, as well a landscape theme, identification signs, parking and driveways.

The Village Centers are the highest intensity urban area of the City, generally developing near intersections with regional importance for transit and connectivity. They are characterized by a cluster of community and neighborhood oriented areas with local commercial, office, entertainment, recreation, and mixed use spaces serving the day to day needs of the surrounding groups of neighborhoods. These centers should contain	
Master Planned Community he Master Planned Community designation provides for large-scale (160 cres or more) master planned developments that include a true variety of esidential products, including larger lots and smaller, attached housing,		public gathering spaces and/ or civic uses with a character and identity that reflects the special character of the area. Uses will be integrated to the maximum extent possible in order to encourage a pedestrian-oriented design and transit ridership. The density range should exceed 18 dwelling units per acre when located within a 1/4 mile walk to a transit station or stop.
